FPFD Chief Frye retires after 25 years, five as chief

Assistant Chief Judsen named chief, to start Dec. 24

THREE RIVERS — Mike Frye, who has been with the Fabius Park Fire Department for 25 years, and the last five as fire chief, will officially retire on Dec. 24. Replacing him as chief will be Josh Judsen, who has been with the Fabius-Park Fire Department for 12 years and the past five as assistant fire chief. The 31-yearold was approved as the new fire chief at the FPFD fire board's last meeting on Wednesday, Dec. 4, and will start on Dec. 24.

Frye, 57, who announced he would retire back in November, told the Commercial-News in an interview Thursday he will miss the "fire family" and the comradery at the department. "That's probably the biggest thing that's kept me there," Frye said. "It's just like a big family."

Judsen said in an interview with the Commercial-News Thursday he's looking forward to his new role, and is excited to "move forward and progress" the fire department as chief.

"The big thing I want to start pushing, and Mike's tried over the last few years, is training," Judsen said. "I want to train a lot harder, put more funds toward it and

Brandenburg Concert to present winter concert

The Brandenburg Concert, a group of community-based a cappella singers from southwestern Michigan and northern Indiana, will present their winter concert, Rejoice and Sing, on Sunday, Dec. 15. Panel vote sends Trump impeachment charges to full House

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democrats propelled President Donald Trump's impeachment toward a historic vote by the full U.S. House as the Judiciary Committee on Friday approved charges of abuse of power and obstruction of Congress. It's the latest major step in the constitutional and political storm that has divided Congress and the nation.

The House is expected to approve the two articles of impeachment next week, before lawmakers depart for the holidays.

The partisan split in the committee vote — 23 Democrats to 17 Republicans — reflects the atmosphere in Congress. The Democraticmajority House is expected to approve the charges against Trump next week, but the Republican-controlled Senate is likely to acquit him after a January trial.

Trump is accused, in the first article, of abusing his presidential power by asking Ukraine to investigate his 2020 rival Joe Biden while holding military aid as leverage, and, in the second, of obstructing Congress by blocking the House's efforts to probe his actions.

"Today is a solemn and sad day," Chairman Jerrold Nadler, D-N.Y., told reporters after the session, marking the third time in U.S. history the panel had voted to recommend impeaching a president. He said the full House would act "expeditiously."
